The small frame cottage known as the O. Henry Museum was constructed in 1886 at 308 E. Fourth Street in Austin, The house, in a simplified version of the Eastlake style, originally consisted of a parlor, front hall, dining room, kitchen and one bedroom. This typical L-shaped Victorian cottage plan had a veranda across the front and rear elevations.

The frame structure is sheathed in clapboarding. The projecting bay on the main or north elevation has wooden decorative elements projecting from the barge board. These elements include drop finials on the ends of the barge boards, a horizontal cross member, a vertical king-post which projects beyond the roof, cross bracing and a circular fan-like decorative element unifying the composition. The windows have shallow pedimented lintels with applied wooden rosettes. All windows are shuttered. The porches have scroll saw balustrades, turned posts and scroll saw brackets and spandrels.

In 1893, a back bedroom, an unplumbed bath and lavatory were added. This enclosed the east side of the rear veranda. The end wall was sheathed in clapboarding and, with the inset doorway this space became a back hall. The narrow oak flooring in the addition was in contrast to the wide board Bastrop pine used in the 1886 portion of the house. The interior of the residence contains has a handsome dark woodwork.

The house has remained basically unchanged to the present. The City of Austin accepted the house in January 1934, and moved it to Brush Square in March 1934, to save it from demolition. The City installed electricity and plumbing in the same year and opened the structure as a museum in June 1934. Some interior restoration work has been done in 1969 and 1972. For the most part, however, the house has remained unchanged since the time of the Porter family occupation. The first Mrs. William S. Porter lived in Austin until her death. The museum has subsequently acquired furniture, china, photographs, letters and other memorabilia which belonged to the family.



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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The small, frame cottage in the Eastlake style, at 409 East 5th Street is the only extant residence in Austin in which William Sidney Porter (1862-1910) lived.

Porter was born in Greensboro, North Carolina on September 11, 1862, and came to Texas in 1882. In 1884, at the age of twenty-two, he settled in Austin. During this period he held various jobs including working in a drug store and becoming a real estate agent. From 1887 to 1891, he worked as a draftsman in the General Land Office, located on the Capitol grounds. From 1891 until 1894, he worked as a bank teller in the First National Bank (then located at 6th and Congress streets, in Austin.)

On July 5, 1887, Porter married Athol Estes. After living in various houses, the Porter family moved in 1893 to the residence which is now called the O. Henry Museum. At this time, the structure was located at 308 E. Fourth Street, a few blocks from its present location. The Porter family lived in the house for two years. It was during this period (1894) that Porter resigned his position in the bank to give all his time to editing a humorous weekly, The Rolling Stone. When the venture failed in 1895, Porter moved to Houston, where he wrote for the Houston Daily Post.

In 1896 Porter was summoned to Austin to stand trail for the alleged embezzelment of funds from the First National Bank, where he had been employed as a teller. Rather than obeying the summons, Porter fled to New Orleans and then to Honduras. Returning to Austin in 1897 to visit his sick wife, Porter was arrested and in March, 1898, was sentenced to the federal penitentiary at Columbus, Ohio.

While in prison, Porter wrote under various pseudonyms. Eventually, the name, "O. Henry", displaced all the others. In 1902, after his release from prison, he went to New York to continue his writing. Among Porter's most famous stories are "The Gift of the Magi" and "The Ransom of Red Chief."

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

A SHORT BIOGRAPHY OF O. HENRY

- 1862 September 11, born at the "Worth Place" Guilford County, a plantation near Greensboro, North Carolina.
- 1865 September 26, death of his mother, Mrs. Algernon Sidney Porter (Mary Virginia Swaim) from consumption while living on the plantation.
- 1865 His father, Dr. Algernon Sidney Porter brought the two boys, Shirley Worth and William Sidney to live with his mother, Mrs. Sidney Porter (Ruth Worth) in her home in Greensboro, North Carolina.
- 1867 Enrollment in the private elementary school of his maiden aunt, Evelina Porter, who established the first school in Greensboro and was affectionately known as 'Miss Lina."
- 1876__His graduation from Miss Lina's school with highest honors.
- 1876 His enrollment in the Linsey Street High School of Greensboro, North Carolina.
- 1879 He went to work as bookkeeper for his Uncle Clark in the W. C. Porter and Company Drug Store.
- 1881 August 20, date on which he became a licensed pharmacist in North Carolina. He was nineteen years old at the time.
- 1882 He came to Texas on a visit but stayed on to work as sheep herder and ranch hand on the Lee and Richard Hall ranch in LaSalle County.
- 1884 He departed the rugged "wide open spaces" for the "busy marts of commerce and trade" which was Austin, Texas. He was twenty-two years old at the time.
- 1884 He applied and was accepted as pharmacist at the Morley Brothers Drug Store on East 6th Street and worked there a short time.
- 1885 March 2, he was designated to escort to the "german" Athol Estes, the high school girl who had participated in the "laying of the corner stone" ceremonies. At this time he was Lieutenant William Porter, a member of the Austin Grays.
- 1886 He organized the "Hill City Quartette" composed of R. H. Edmonson, H. H. Long, C. E. Hillyer and W. S. Porter.
- 1886 His employment by the Maddox Brothers and Anderson, a real estate firm in Austin.
- 1887 He obtained the position as draftsman at the Texas Land Office.
- July 1, he married Athol Estes, step-daughter of Mr. P. G. Roach, merchant of Austin and member of the Board of Trade.
- 1889___September 30, birth of his daughter, Margaret Worth Porter.
- 1890 August 7, death of his Grandmother, Ruth Worth Porter.
- 1890 His first visit to the home folks in Greensboro and to show off the new wife and baby.

- 1891 His change from the Texas Land Office (a political appointment) to employment by the First National Bank of Austin.
- May 15 to 18, during the celebration held for the completion of the dam and lake, the Austin Musicians Union put on a play, H.M.S. Pinafore by Gilbert and Sullivan. It was staged on the deck of the steamer, Ben Hur, pulled into dock. Both Athol and Will Porter sang in the chorus and attended the "German" given afterward.
- 1884___The beginning of the publication, "The Rolling Stone."
- 1894___His resignation as teller at the First National Bank.
- 1895 The end of "The Rolling Stone" which backed a losing political candidate.
- 1895 Acceptance of a position with the Houston Post where he developed the "Some Postscripts" column.
- 1896 Re-examination of 1894 bank shortages on circumstantial evidence. His arrest on charges of embezzlement.
- 1896 Arrangement made for bond. Trial set for July 7 in the United States District Court of Austin, Texas.
- July 6, his departure from Houston to appear in court in Austin. A victim of suffering and humiliation, he caught the train at Hempstead and fled to New Orleans, then on to Honduras.
- 1897 February 5, returned to Austin on learning that his wife was very ill. He surrendered to the Court but no action was taken while his appeal was pending in the U. S. Court of Civil Appeals in New Orleans.
- July 25, death of Athol (Estes) Porter. Buried in Oakwood Cemetery. For years the Porters made their home with Mr. and Mrs. P. G. Roach at 307 East 4th Street where Athol passed away.
- During this waiting period Will Porter spent much of his time around the Roach-Hofer Grocery Store at 211 East 6th Street. In the rear of the store a stairway led up to a mezzanine floor where Will had a desk and a few chairs. Here he wrote for various newspapers and sent in articles to magazines.
- December, sale of the short story, "The Miracle of Lava Canyon" to S. S. McClure Company, which published it in September 1898. His first short story accepted by a national publisher. The social and business life of Austin made a great impact on William Sidney Porter, and from it he drew the material for many of his greatest stories.
