7 **DESCRIPTION**

1 Julie File

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on the northwest corner of 19th and Rio Grande Streets, six blocks from the University of Texas, stands the Goodall Wooten House, built on what was the outskirts of Austin in 1898-99. The Wooten House property, originally bounded by 19th, Rio Grande, 21st, and Pearl Streets, presently encompasses only the southeast portion of that initial block. Standing on the edge of a student residential area, the house has been encroached by a growing commercial strip along 19th St. Although the site has been considerably diminished, the large yard, as well as the vantage point on a hill, does insure some degree of isolation for the Wooten House.

The Wootens sold half of their block after they opened up an alley immediately north of their stables. This north portion of the property had been used as a barn yard and pasture. To the west of the house was a garden area with a swimming pool and house for the Wootens' son. But this portion was also sold and is presently the location of a Medical Center. The yard was further diminished with the widening of 19th Street, removing a large portion of the front lawn.

The initial plan of the Wooten House was basically that of a block with truncated hipped roof, but the plan was changed slightly in 1910 with the extension of the library on the southwest portion of the house. In addition, the gallery was extended across the front to include the addition. A one-story, hipped roof porte-cochere supported by two Ionic columns extends from the west facade of the library addition. The present house contains five sets of two-story, freestanding, coupled Ionic columns across the south or main facade supporting a wide entablature with dentilled cornice. The two main floors contain a balustraded gallery. Sheltering the secondary entrance on the east facade is a double balustraded gallery supported by one-story coupled Ionic columns. At each corner of the galleries the columns are grouped in threes. A balustraded deck encircles the flat roof of the south and east galleries.

Dormers protrude from the hipped roof opening up the attic level. Originally these windows were only decorative, for the attic was not used. In fact, a chimney rises through a dormer at the rear (north) facade. Since the 1940's, however, this floor has been converted into student rooms.

The building material is basically masonry with some wood ornamentation. The house rests on a raised foundation of rusticated stone capped by

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smooth stone coursing. The main block of the house is constructed of brick with stone detail. The large windows have flat stone lintels and the main double entrance has a stone lintel with carved detail and a round arch with carved keystone. The two-story stone columns have beautifully carved capitals, purportedly carved by the same man who carved the columns for Biltmore, the Vanderbilt Home in North Carolina.

The major alteration to the exterior has been the enclosing of the second floor galleries to provide more bedroom space and replacing the original wood shingles with red asbestos tiles. In addition, recent owners have had little regard for landscaping and the lawn has deteriorated. The outbuildings, i.e. the stables and servants' quarters, remain standing to the north of the house, but they have been converted into student apartments.

The interior of the house has a basement, two main floors and an attic level. The basement floor was originally used for storage, game rooms, and servants' sleeping quarters. The walls are of rough cut stone, plastered over in the game rooms and the servants' quarters, and the floors are of concrete.

On the ground floor the main entrance, centrally located before the 1910 addition, opens into a foyer. Intended as the most elaborate room in the house, this entry hall contains a beautiful wood-carved false fireplace and decorative molding around the ceiling and windows. The front door and two flanking windows originally contained geometrical patterns of cut glass. To the left of the foyer is the library, enlarged in 1910 and equipped with special construction features to eliminate the outside noise. The walls were of a double wall construction using masonry exterior wall and a stud frame wall inside over which a canvas was stretched, providing acoustical properties. The floor is floated on about a quarter of an inch of saw dust and then carpeted to further insure insulation. To the right of the foyer is the living room and behind the living room is the dining room. The doors connecting the library, foyer, living room, and dining room were all double sliding doors, establishing a flow of spaces, but these have been enclosed to provide small apartment entrances. The kitchen and dining room are connected by a small butler's pantry.

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The second floor of the Wooten House has five bedrooms, each of which has a fireplace and mantle similar to the one in the main foyer. The third floor, originally an attic, now contains additional rooms.



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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Goodall Wooten House, built in 1898-1899, was presented to Dr. and Mrs. Wooten as a wedding gift from Goodall Wooten's father, Thomas Dudley Wooten. Designed by Charles O'Connell, a Dallas architect, the original structure cost \$8,100. In 1910 the addition to the library and the extension of the gallery across the front cost \$10,000.

The original owner of the house, Goodall Harrison Wooten, was born in Paris, Texas, in 1869 and moved to Austin with his family in 1872. After receiving his B.S. and M.A. degrees from the University of Texas in 1891 and 1892 and a degree from the New York College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1895, he began practicing medicine in Austin. Wooten served as president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce in 1926 and 1937. In 1935 he and his wife gave 125 acres of land on Bull Creek to form a boy scout camp, named in honor of their son, Tom Wooten.

Dr. Wooten married Ella Newsome in 1897. Also an active civic volunteer, Mrs. Wooten was the first woman to serve on the Board of Directors for the Chamber of Commerce, was a charter member of the Red Cross, and served on the Board of Directors for Brackenridge Hospital.

The property surrounding the house included an entire city block and was beautifully landscaped with flowers, fruit trees and sculptures. Mrs. Wooten landscaped her lawn with formal gardens containing tree wisterias, azaleas, tulips, a large formal rose garden with a central fountain, as well as an aviary with parakeets. As her reputation as a gardener gained notoriety, the first spring garden pilgrimage in Austin was organized to display Mrs. Wooten's gardens. Although the beautiful landscaping around the Wooten House has since deteriorated, the spring garden pilgrimage remains an annual Austin event.

Following the death of Goodall Wooten in 1942, Mrs. Wooten sold the house to Fred Adams near the end of World War II. After the war there was a severe housing shortage at the University of Texas; thus, Adams enclosed the second floor gallery and furnished the third floor with



additional bedrooms and baths to provide for student housing. In addition, Adams sold many of the exterior plants and transformed the garden areas on the west side of the house into parking areas. First leased as a women's dormitory and sorority, the house was sold in the early 1950's to the Christian Faith and Life Community as a dormitory and meeting hall.

The Wooten House has recently changed hands and is now leased as a student boarding house. The Living Services Inc. is planning to buy the house to restore as a residence and center for quadraplegics attending the University of Texas.

The name of the Wooten family is common to Austin residents, for there is a Goodall Wooten dorm, Goodall Wooten park, Goodall Wooten elementary school and Tom Wooten camp. This house has local historical significance as the home of this prominent Austin family. Acclaimed for its unique landscaping and imposing architecture, the Wooten House is a good example of Austin's trend toward the classical revival styles at the turn-of-the-century. The celebrated Austin residence was featured in newspaper articles, in early photographic surveys of Austin, and on early postcards of Austin landmarks. The house remains important for it has had little permanent alteration. Standing at the edge of a student residential area, the Wooten house is significant as an anchor for that district. With the rapid growth of the University buildings and encroaching commercial establishments, the planned restoration of the Wooten House is an important step toward preserving the residential quality of the area.
