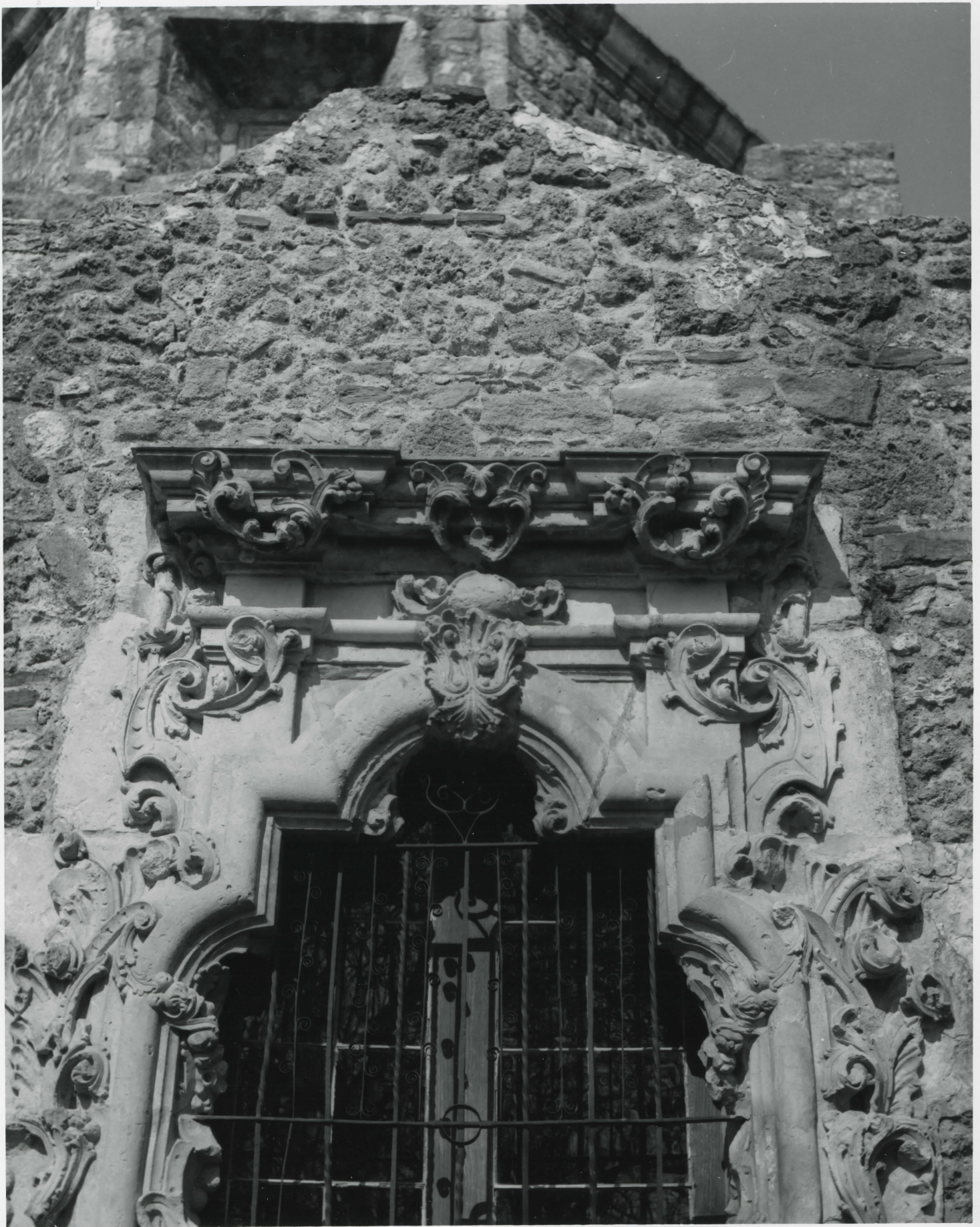

It apparently is a product of the same movement which caused the cracks in the sacristy (on the other side of the wall). A part of the crack was grouted several years ago and there seems to be no further movement. A close watch should be kept on this.

2. The finely carved wooden doors of the church were treated with a silicone several years ago and is probably no longer effective. The wood is nicely weatherbeaten now but shows signs of deterioration. Treatment with a wood preservative with a pentachlorophenol base is recommended.

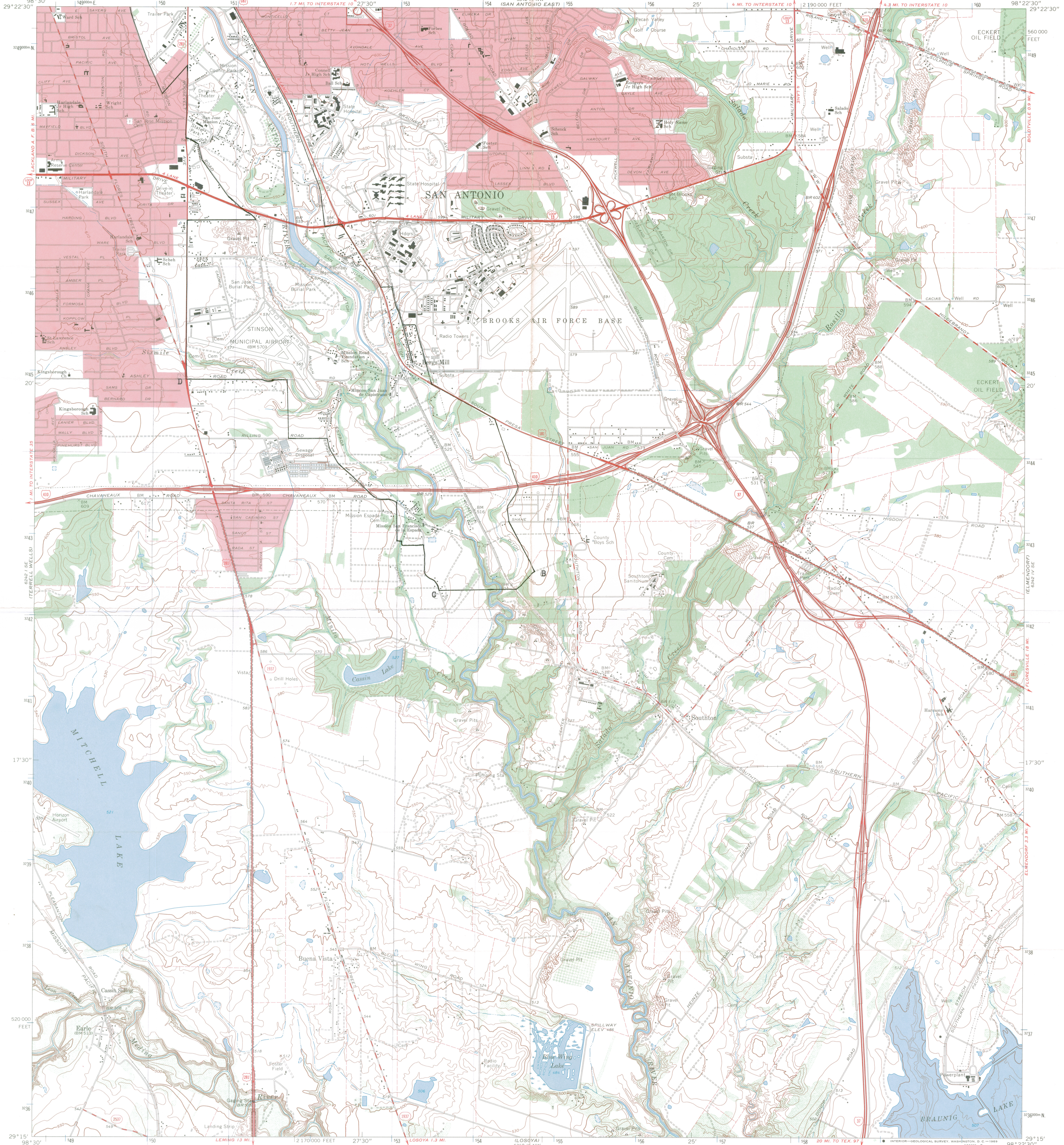
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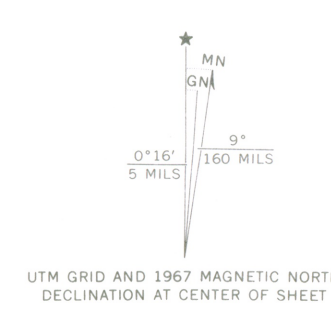

## Annual Report for 1969-70

### San Jose Mission National Historic Site

Two visits were made to San Jose during the year and an inspection of the buildings was made on each occasion. The visits were made at the times of meetings of the San Jose Mission Advisory Board, on September 5, 1969 and February 24, 1970.

A great special event at San Jose occurred on February 23 when the 250th anniversary of the founding of the mission was celebrated by a votive mass with the Most Reverend Francis J. Furey as Principal Celebrant.

#### Need for Archeological Investigations.

A most pressing need exists for extensive trenching, both within the mission quadrangle and in open areas surrounding the existing buildings. The purpose of the excavations will be to record data for preparation of a Historic Base Map. At the present time, there is no record of the numerous cultural remains which lie buried within the quadrangle. Because of this, when pipe lines and trails were constructed, the workmen encountered and damaged historic features.

State Archeologist Tunnel is willing to do the work when funds are available.

#### Condition of the Buildings.

The church is in excellent condition even though there are some minor maintenance and stabilization needs. The most pressing of these is the necessity of getting rid of the plants which grow on the walls. A long letter which listed my recommendations for stabilization at both San Jose and Purissima Concepcion churches was sent to Monsigneur Janacek in March.

Many of the reconstructed rooms of the quadrangle, particularly near the southeast corner, have serious settling cracks. The movement of the walls evidently caused a number of leaks in the roofs of the rooms. The roofs were repaired more than a year ago and, if there is no further movement of the walls, everything will probably be all right. A close watch should be kept on the rooms, however.

Condition of the Grounds.

On both visits, the grounds were found well kept.

During the W.P.A. work at San Jose, ramadas were placed in front of the rooms all around the quadrangle. There was no archeological evidence that ramadas were ever placed in just that manner. Through the years, these had become pretty moth-eaten in appearance and presented something of a hazard to visitors because most of the poles were rotten. The ramadas were removed during the past winter and I believe this has improved the appearance of the quadrangle.

## History of the Mission

San Jose Mission was founded on February 23, 1720, by Venerable Antonio Margil, O. F. M., and the Governor of Texas, Marquis de San Miguel de Aguayo, who gave orders to Captain Juan Valdez of the Presidio of San Antonio de Bexar to establish the new mission.

Fr. Margil placed in charge of the mission Fr. Agustin Patron and Fr. Miguel Nunez de Haro, and the latter was missionary at San Jose for 32 years, until his death in 1752.

In 1740 Fr. Nunez moved San Jose Mission to its present location - the third site occupied. It developed into one of the most successful missions and became known as the "Queen of the Missions."

The new church was started in 1768 and finished about 1782. The original sacristy with its "Rose Window" still stands today, but a part of the north wall collapsed in 1868, and in 1874 the dome and roof caved in.

In 1824 the mission was completely secularized and ceased to be a mission. The last missionary at San Jose was Fr. Jose Antonio Diaz de Leon. He was the last missionary in all of Texas, having been shot to death near Nacogdoches in 1834.

After 1840 the church of San Jose was used occasionally for religious purposes.

From 1859 to 1868 Mission San Jose was in the care of the Benedictine Fathers from Pennsylvania. It was then abandoned again until 1872, when the Holy Cross Fathers from Notre Dame, Indiana, took charge until 1888.

Sometime between 1880 and 1890 the richly carved wooden doors disappeared. The statues in the church had been ruined by soldiers during the revolutionary wars.

The Redemptorist Fathers were in charge of San Jose Mission from 1923 until 1931, when the Franciscan Fathers (St. Louis Province) returned after an absence of more than one hundred years.

In 1928 the tower collapsed.

In 1936 the Mission was restored and was declared a National Historical Site in 1941.
