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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Bivins House at 1000 Polk Street in Amarillo is a two-story and attic brick mansion with limestone trim and a two-story pedimented portico across the front. In its overall composition, the house is a West Texas version of the late Georgian Revival style. The architectural detailing illustrates a more eclectic combination of Edwardian bay windows, leaded glass, and rusticated stone trim in addition to the Georgian Revival elements. The roof is hipped with a balustraded deck, large dormer windows, and wide eaves.

The entrance is framed in the two-story pedimented portico with fanlight. The composite columns which support the projecting pediment are in a group of three at either end of the simple entablature, while the remainder of the portico is supported by one composite column at either end.

Massive steps with stone balustrade lean to the first floor entrance and are terminated by large cement urns. The front door, which is glazed with leaded millions in the transom and sidelights, is enframed in a massive stone segmental arch. This is in turn flanked by ornate leaded glass windows on either side.

Above the front door is a gently curved balcony and balustrade which is accessible from the second floor doorway. This entrance is very similar to that of the first floor in scale and detail.

A two-story brick octagonal bay occupies the space under the portico and to the left of the front door. It is striped with a stone band which follows the lines of the window sills and lintels. The windows are large with one pane per sash, which is characteristic of the period when the house was built. The space to the right of the entrance is occupied by a large window on each floor, similar in design to the center window of those in the bay.

AREAS OF SIGNIFICANCE (Ch	eck One or More as Appropriat	e)						
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This impressive brick mansion with limestone trim was the home of the Bivins family, prominent in the early days of ranching in Texas and the Southwest. In the grandeur of the overall composition and in the solidness of the material the builder achieved an appropriate expression for the original owner, Lee Bivins, and the times he personified.

The building of the Bivins Home began in 1904. Labor difficulties developed during the construction while Mr. Lee Bivins was away on business, so Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Bivins discharged the craftsmen with whom she was having difficulties and she then employed replacements. In addition to taking personal supervision of the craftsmen, she painted the murals in the dining room. It required eighteen months to complete the house. This landmark has always been one of the showplaces of the Panhandle and a constant reminder of the role of the Bivins family in the heritage of the region.

Mr. Lee Bivins was born in Grayson County, Texas, in October of 1862. In 1890 he purchased a ranch southwest of Claude, Texas, known as Mulberry Pasture. A few years later he purchased the old Crow Bar Ranch northwest of Amarillo and moved to that city. In 1906 he purchased the LX Ranch north of the city and acquired the brand which is known throughout the Southwest. Later he bought the LIT Ranch near Lascosa, the Coldwater Ranch south of Texhoma, a part of the XIT holdings near Channing and a large ranch near Fort Sumner, New Mexico. At the time of his death he owned approximately 500,000 acres of land and was recognized as the largest individual cattle operator in the world. He often had 60,000 head in his ownership. The natural gas deposit on this land also resulted in his owning the largest proven gas acreage in the United States. In addition to these vast holdings, he leased more than a million acres located in Texas, New Mexico, and other states. Besides his fabulous cattle, natural gas, and land interests, Bivins had large holdings in Amarillo

property and was a stockholder in many Amarillo and Panhandle firms.

The civic and philanthropic activity of Mr. Bivins also is noteworthy. He served for one term as County Commissioner of Armstrong County. He was president of the Panhandle Livestock Association for one term, and was also a director of the Texas-Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Inc. for many years. For a long period of years, he served actively on the building committee of the First Christian Church. He contributed substantially to the programs of Methodist Church and Christian Church Colleges in Texas. This pioneer cattleman and civic leader was serving his fourth year as mayor of Amarillo when he died in January of 1929.

After the death of Mr. Lee Bivins, his wife, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Bivins, continued the charitable contributions of the Bivins family. Hundreds of Texas Panhandle Plains stockmen remember her best as a spirited bidder at the annual sale of boys' livestock in the 4H and FFA Auctions at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show. Mrs. Bivins seldom kept the stock she bought from the boys. After she had bought an animal she usually designated it for re-sale with the proceeds to benefit one of the many charities she assisted. Another one of Mrs. Bivins' noted contributions was the creation of the Mary E. Bivins Foundation. foundation financed the construction of a home for elderly people. This home for the elderly accommodated 50 to 70 persons, including operating personnel, and is located on a 35 acre tract in east The Mary E. Bivins Foundation also endows the continued maintenance of this home for the elderly. Mrs. Bivins bequeathed her family home to the City of Amarillo at the time of her death in 1951. The City of Amarillo operates the Bivins' family home as the Mary E. Bivins Memorial Library.



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

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
