Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The old St. Anthony's Church (now the Violet Museum) is located in Violet, Texas at the southeast corner of the intersection of Texas State Highway 44 and South Violet Road. Built in 1910, the original structure was a simple, one-story rectangular (26' x 40') wood frame board and batten structure with wood shingled gable roof and an attached gable roofed porch. Each of the sides of the structure was six bays wide, while the front had a window on either side of the door and one centered under the roof ridge. All windows were of the four over four, double hung sash variety. Atop the main roof ridge at the front was a Latin cross, and a five-pointed star embellished the gable end over the porch.

Additions were made to the building in 1919, and horizontal beveled cypress siding was applied. The length of the building was extended, with paired windows added to the side walls at the rear. A single tower was constructed at the center of the back wall, providing room inside for a sculpture niche behind the altar. To provide space for a choir loft, the front of the building was extended and square twin towers were added. The front and sides of the towers have paired windows at the first level and single round windows above. The towers have hipped roofs, but only one is topped by a belfry, which has arched openings and a pyramidal roof crowned by a cross. Double panel doors form the main entrance, which is flanked by small four over four windows. Above the doors are three windows, four over four lights on either side of a six over six opening. A cross tops the main gable at the front. At the time of this remodeling, all the windows were embellished with moldings forming round arches above the window heads. Further decoration is provided by a dentil-like trim under the eaves of the towers and front gable.

An interesting feature of the interior is the ceiling, with its beamed pattern resembling coffers. Around the perimeter is an elaborate 6' tall molding. The top portion (4') is beaver board and milled wood; underneath that is a 2' rolled galvanized metal molding. Interior walls and ceiling of St. Anthony's are beaver board, painted in the original colors of cream with dark brown trim. The flooring also is original, and the exteior colors of cream with rust trim are the same as those used in the early remodeling.

In 1920, the small board and batten rectory which had been built in 1912 was moved, enlarged, and connected with the church itself at the south rear side.

Upon the construction of a new church in 1952, Old St. Anthony's was moved to Clarkwood, four miles away, and served as the St. Anthony's parish mission until 1972, when the Clarkwood congregation built a new church. For three years Old St. Anthony's was not used; but in 1975 the building was again moved, this time returning it to Violet. Through much community effort, the church was restored to its 1920 appearance. The structure is now a community museum.

Many of the early furniture pieces and artifacts, such as the handmade vestment case, baptismal font, altar, and statue groupings have been returned to the church and are displayed in their original locations there.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The old St. Anthony's Church is significant as an architectural representation of the early South Texas farming community of Violet (originally Land Siding, the name was changed in 1913) which was settled by German Catholics in the early 1900's. German immigrants to Texas in the 19th century were predominantly of the Lutheran faith, and consequently the church is important for its association with German-Catholic Texans. It serves as one of the few reminders of the rural church-centered life which the settlers led. Many of Violet's early structures have been demolished, partly due to highway expansion. However, the church building remains as a charming vernacular architectural expression which exhibits Romanesque Revival stylistic traits. Features of the style used include the two towers and triple window above the entrance. Although the windows themselves are rectangular sash, painted wood molding forms contrasting round-headed arches around each. This typically Romanesque feature is found also in the tower openings. Masonry churches in this style frequently employ brick corbeling for decoration. Here, such a decorative element has been loosely translated to wood, in the trim under the eaves.

Violet was founded by John W. Hoelscher in 1908 as a community of Catholic German-Americans. In 1910, ten acres of land were donated by Louis Petrus to provide a location for a church. Labor for the building was provided free by the parishioners, with John W. Hoelscher serving as foreman and supplying much of the funds to pay for the building materials. The simple rectangular structure served as both the first church and first school for the community.

Because of the community's growth, the structure became inadequate a few years later. The ReverendMark Moeslein, commuting pastor of St. Anthony's, who is said to have had an architectural background, drew plans to enlarge and remodel the church. Once again, the farmers did the work. Perhaps Rev. Moeslein was recalling a Romanesque church or pictures of one which he had seen. The towers, roofs, and round arch forms suggest this possibility.

After the parishioners had built a new church in 1952, the old church building was moved four miles to Clarkwood, where it served as a mission church until 1972. At that time the Clarkwood congregation built a new church. Old St. Anthony's stood abandoned, but in 1975 it was returned to its first home of Violet, and sited 200 feet east of its original location. The exterior of the building has been restored to its 1920 appearance, and is now the Violet Museum, housing local memorabilia and exhibits about the community's German heritage. The church has integral ties to the Violet community, not only as a

place of worship, but also as an example of vernacular architecture. Only one professional carpenter was employed, during the 1919 alterations. The early members of the community built this church, later remodeled it, and descendants of those German-Americans were instrumental in restoring the church in the 1970's. The two moves which the church has undergone do not adversely affect the building's historic and cultural integrity. They are, instead, an important part of the structure's evolution from Violet's first church and school, to its parish mission in Clarkwood, and to its present function as a local museum.




